

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Artist and Social Crusader

Born on August 13, 1954 in Loralai, Balochistan, Pakistan, in a Parsi family, Jimmy Engineer was to grow up to break all barriers of caste, creed or religion.

Jimmy completed his schooling from St. Anthony's High School, Lahore, and after a brief interlude at the Forman Christian College, spent three years with the National College of Arts. He became a professional painter in 1976. His relevance to the rich as well as the poor, literate or illiterate, religious or atheistic, speaks volumes for his dedication and honesty. He strives to bring succour and relief to those in need of help. Though an artist by profession, his true passion in life has been a deep concern for fellow human beings and their welfare. Much of his efforts for supporting individuals as well as institutions have remained undocumented and unsung. But he has continued to be a crusader for the oppressed, the disabled and the mentally challenged. He has the rare ability to communicate with people from all walks of life. His numerous walks have taken him across the length and breadth of the country in pursuit of diverse objectives, mostly to promote human rights, enhance the quality of life and to create an equitable civil society in the country.



Jimmy has created in excess of 2,000 original artworks and nearly 1,000 calligraphies. Over 200,000 prints of his exquisite work are in private collections in more than 50 countries. He has held over 60 art exhibitions around the world and led more than 50 walks for noble causes in addition to arranging in excess of 150 awareness programmes for handicapped, blind and orphan children.
